IS TARTAN AND PLAID THE SAME?

Some people say that tartan is Scottish and plaid is Irish. Not so. The difference is that the tartan is recorded with the Scottish Registry of Tartans (a division of the National Archives of Scotland) as an authentic weave of one's family. Each authentic tartan has a specified thread count (so many threads of green, so many threads of red and so on. This doesn't mean that every time a tartan is woven, the actual number of threads must be exactly as the thread counted listed by the Scottish Registry. It is the ratio of colors to one another which is important and providing this remains constant, the number of threads in a tartan may be varied according to the type of cloth being woven.

One complete thread pattern is called a sett. The setts repeat themselves forming the tartan. Plaid doesn't follow this ratio or thread count and therefore cannot be certified as authentic.


So the key to tartan identification is in the 'sett' or pattern. It is the pattern, not the width of the sett or the shade of color that identifies the tartan.

Today, modern tartan weavers generally use dark blues and greens and bright reds and yellows produced by man-made dyes. The 'old', 'ancient', 'muted' and 'weathered' colors tend to be in lighter and softer shades because they were originally produced using vegetable, mineral and plant dyes hundreds of years ago. Modern man-made dyes can create an infinite spectrum of colors that duplicate the older colors. Many people have difficulty understanding and accepting this distinction. They have been brainwashed into thinking that if they are wearing a kilt in ancient colors, they are wearing a more authentic tartan than one in a modern color. Also, the color palette varies depending on which woolen mill produced the cloth. Whatever color your kilt, wear it with pride!



This month's tartan is the Edinburgh District tartan. It was designed in 1970 to mark the Commonwealth Games being held there that year. In more recent times this pattern has provided inspiration for two different patterns named Dunedin in Florida and Dunedin in New Zealand. 'Dunedin' is an alternative (or lyrical) form of Edinburgh used by the towns in these countries. The colors have symbolic references to the City of Edinburgh.
